Hello families of Palmerston!

2022 is an exciting year with many new families, many new teachers, many new ideas and clarity of vision to ensure your child has a wonderful time at school, learning in all directions.

Positive start

We are completely in awe of our students and the manner in which they are just accepting what learning looks likes since Week 1. Cohorting out on the playground, difference in break times and washing hands like champions – we could not be more proud of how our students are managing. I take my hat off to our teachers, who are doing a sterling job wearing masks all day – voices are strained at the end of every day – but we all understand what must be done to keep everyone safe. As Execs, we all fall under the cohorting rules, so we cannot visit all classes, like we did in the past, and that is terribly difficult for us – but we are loving the photos we see from teachers and peeking in windows!

Family connections

We want to be ambitious and grow and community connections with more families this year — we are hoping to raise the engagement level of families contributing to our school to make it the best it can be. We have had some fabulous families already paving the way with our attempt to make the front of our school more appealing and in line with many front yards boasting incredible agapanthus gardens.

Our new buildings are delayed to the pandemic and available resources, so we have some time to plan with you, what landscaping in and around the buildings can look like, so please keep an eye out for upcoming Working Bee's on a Saturday.

Covid and it's impact

Like so many places around Canberra and further afield, we are feeling the impact of positive cases at school with staff and students. For anyone at home now with Covid, I send you all my positive vibes for a swift recovery. We really need the honesty and support from all of our families to test your child twice a week, and to please keep them home if they are unwell, have symptoms, and if they have Covid. If a child is asymptomatic and positive, they cannot come to school. We are relying on the integrity of all of our families to keep us all safe. We do have positive cases across the school, but it is the early years that are showing the greatest numbers. We have been working very closely with ACT Health and the ACT Directorate of Education to get information out to you as soon as we receive it—sometimes this is well into the evening, please know we send letters out immediately upon receiving them. We are delighted that we can hand out RATs today to each child—so please make sure you check school bags to retrieve them and store under 30 degrees.

Carpark and foot traffic

We understand the difficulties the beginning of the year that the allocated entry and exit gates bring for parents to come onsite to collect their child, but, we must reiterate again please the **essential need** to have polite, respectful driving behaviours in our carpark. We must all do everything we can to keep every child safe. PLEASE do NOT park in the drop off zones – this is stopping the entire flow of how the carpark was designed to be used. Now, that we are two weeks into school, and students know the routines, could we please ask you to consider a pick up spot on the oval to meet your child if possible?

Routine parking inspectors come to the school at random times, so please be cautious as to where you park — it is a tricky space we all know. If the drop off zone was clear at all times, parents can flow in anytime between 3.00pm and 3.15pm.... taking away the urgency to be there at 3pm exactly. Could you please help us to achieve this goal?


Bradley is a keen builder and has enjoyed creating this amazing rocket ship with the magnetic tiles.


Preschool Legless Lizards love playing outside. They are on the obstacle course practising their climbing skills.


We aspire to support children to develop a sense of themselves as 'confident and capable learners.'

Year 6

Year 6 students have been busy developing teamwork strategies and getting to know the teachers and their peers. To develop collaborative learning skills, students have worked in small groups to design, make and share solutions to problems posed in quality picture books such as 'The Windy Farm' by Doug MacLeod.

We are building 'Word Conscious Classrooms' to improve our spelling and writing. Our text 'Tomorrow When The War Began' is providing opportunities for us to learn, study and understand new vocabulary. We are also using this novel to develop deeper knowledge on our key inquiry concept of 'Power'.

Each class has co constructed Positive Behaviour for Learning expectations for each classroom and is developing terminology on the Zones of Regulation. There has been a new club created this year, the Palmerston News, where Year 6 students will create a news segment for the entire school each week, discussing headline topics and key information for students and staff.

We are so lucky to have 'The Deck' as a Year 6 Assembly area. This is a fabulous place for messaging and will be used for break away, collaborative and independent learning opportunities. We are looking forward to working with our students on furniture to complement the learning in this space.



I am working as a Cultural Integrity Coordinator (CIC) at Palmerston District Primary School for Semester 1.

I have been working for the Education Directorate for 14 years in an Indigenous Education Officer and CIC role. I am a mother of 2, I come from a proud Aboriginal family and am also a professional Contemporary Aboriginal Artist.

My role over the semester is to support all teachers and school staff to build and embed cultural integrity in all settings. I intend to do this by developing whole school approaches for enhancing understanding about and through Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories and cultures.

I would love to get to know First Nations students and families in this space and hear your voice about how the school can improve with reflecting our cultures in the curriculum and making the school a culturally safe space for mob. I truly value your voice, and will throughout the semester, connect with you through phone, emails, letters and online surveys. When face -to-face meetings are safe, I'd be happy to have a cuppa and a yarn with you at the school.

A cultural integrity section will now be part of the school newsletter to keep the community updated about our cultural integrity journey, and to share Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures, news and events.

NAPLAN Online is a more engaging assessment that adjusts questions to each student's achievement level. It also delivers more precise results to schools and parents more quickly.

NAPLAN provides valuable information to schools and parents about literacy and numeracy achievement. It supports school improvement processes by enabling teachers to monitor student progress over time and to identify areas of strength and development.

Tips on how to support children's return to school during COVID-19

The start of the school year can be a time of excitement and anxiousness with lots of uncertainty, particularly in the context of an ongoing pandemic. Feeling a range of emotions, positive, negative and everything in between is expected. Parents and carers can support children to understand and navigate these emotional experiences. Testing children for COVID-19 using a rapid antigen test



Information for parents and carers

Rapid antigen tests (RATs) are a quick way to test your child for COVID-19.

PCR testing is also available free of charge at a number of facilities across the ACT. Testing centre locations can be found on the ACT Government's COVID-19 website.

What is a Rapid Antigen Test (RAT)?

RATs involve taking either a saliva sample or nasal swab that is placed into a chemical solution. The result usually takes 10 to 30 minutes

RATs are not recommended for children under 2 years of age. It is recommended young children instead get a PCR test.

If you test positive with a RAT you must isolate immediately and follow guidance on the <u>COVID-19 website</u>.

Using a RAT

A RAT can be used to test your child if they have had a COVID-19 exposure, or if they have symptoms. If the test is positive, your child has COVID. You should register the test and follow the advice online.

If the test is negative, then your child should stay home from school until their symptoms have gone away. If the first test that was negative was a RAT and your child continues to have symptoms, they should take another RAT in 24 hours, or have a PCR test.

If your child has a COVID-19 exposure, a RAT is a useful screening tool, even if your child doesn't have COVID-19 symptoms.

If your child has symptoms of COVID-19, they should not attend school.

If your child has recovered from COVID-19 in the past 4 weeks, COVID-19 testing is not recommended, unless they have developed new COVID-19 symptoms after a period of being well.

It is important to note that you may still test positive to COVID-19 without displaying any symptoms. It is not compulsory for students or staff to do a RAT.

How do I do a RAT with my child?

Each RAT comes with a set of instructions. Please read and follow these instructions closely. Many test manufacturers have instructional videos online that you can also watch.

Reporting positive results

Parents should report a positive RAT to ACT Health via the COVID-19 website.

You should also notify your child's school via email or phone call. You **do not** need to report a negative RAT.

My child is scared/unsure about taking a RAT. What can I do?

We know that some children may find the idea of having a RAT scary or daunting.

There are a number of things you can do to help your child:

- > Talk to your child explain the process ahead of time
- Let them watch you when you next take a test
- > Do the test at a time of day that works best for them (eg when they are less tired)
- You may also like to show them the video

What if a RAT is not suited to my child?

If they have had a COVID exposure or have symptoms then you can take your child for a PCR test.

Remember to practise COVID-safe behaviours, monitor for symptoms and stay home if unwell.

We know this is a stressful time for your child. You may wish to reach out to your school for support or visit the www.education.act. gov.au for handy links to additional support resources.
